2021 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 1. This year, YWCA Kalamazoo purchased three homes to close a gap in transitional housing for needy families.
- 2. We prioritized eliminating financial and transportation barriers to increase access to abortion services, doula care, and genderaffirming care, as well as on-site access to emergency contraception kits through the launch of the Reproductive Health Fund.
- Our newly branded childcare center, The Dreamery, expanded to a second site in the Edison neighborhood in an effort to provide around-the-clock quality care for parents working first, second and third shifts.

FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

Dr. Grace Lubwama is a visionary trailblazer who has led YWCA Kalamazoo with strategic thought, steadfast dedication to our mission, and purposeful action. Her tenure as our CEO began in February 2014. Since then, Dr. Lubwama has transformed and elevated our organization to reach its full potential so much that other organizations have turned to YWCA Kalamazoo for guidance and leadership, both on local and national levels.

The movement that Dr. Lubwama created around racial and gender justice, caring for victims of abuse, providing 24/7 high-quality childcare, and addressing disparate infant mortality issues head-on-is the standard of excellence. As a visionary leader and the first Black woman to serve as CEO of YWCA Kalamazoo, Dr. Lubwama works to address issues of inequity strategically in the long term.

2021 brought us many challenges as a nation. First, we witnessed increased social uprisings, led by primarily Black people, Indigenous people, People of Color, and LGBTQIA+ folks. Unfortunately, widespread support for these uprisings dwindled as quickly as it began; when the news cycle moved on, so did the support of many people with social and racial privilege. There is a long history of this, particularly regarding white people supporting justice and liberation for People of Color. As a phenomenal Black woman and leader, Dr. Lubwama leverages the power of YWCA Kalamazoo's Staff and Board to make the necessary, long-term commitment to advance racial and gender equity beyond moments of viral uprisings. Her leadership inspires us to be unwavering in our commitment to eliminating racism and empowering women.

Our Board of Directors is fully committed to a framework of anti-racism, incorporating it into our governance practices and examining our own biases that may impede us from being wholly engaged in our work. As a Board, we prioritize diversity and anti-racist practices. We are committed to creating a board with racial diversity and one that represents our community and the folks we serve.

It has been my true honor to serve as the Chair of the Board of Directors. Our work has just begun!

Improving the Lives of Children

01.

Providing accessible high-quality early learning and childcare for families

Every child deserves an equitable start in life. In some of Kalamazoo's neighborhoods, nine out of 10 children are not in a high-quality early learning program. This impacts their caregiver's ability to find steady employment and pursue education, and it creates a barrier to an equitable start to their educational career.

YWCA is on a mission to innovate and model best practices at the intersection of education and equity through the development of an effective workforce, and creating access to culturally relevant early childhood education programs.

Building an Effective Workforce

The foundation of quality childcare is an effective workforce. Partnering with others, YWCA piloted the creation of The Edison Early Childhood Education Career Pathway to train and grow a workforce that is recruited from within the neighborhoods the programs are housed. The career pathway provides many supports including a learning coach, GED support, childcare, transportation, and funding for credentialing and apprenticeship programs.

Innovating Early Education at the Intersection of Education and Equity

YWCA's two childcare centers – The Dreamery at Downtown and The Dreamery at Edison, provide comprehensive, trauma-informed programs that enable families to work outside of the home, while their children are safe learning and having fun. For children and families experiencing systemic violence, YWCA's early education and childcare spaces are meant to be a space of connection and inspiration where learning can occur. The Dreamery at Edison provides infant and toddler early learning programs, 2nd-and 3rd-shift childcare, and 24-hour drop-in childcare services. It is the only childcare center of its kind in Michigan.

Engaging Families in Meaningful Ways

Children exist within the context of their family. In order to support the whole child, families must be included in the learning experience of the child. The YWCA's early education and childcare centers pursue this at a fundamental level– sharing power and decision-making among all stakeholders and creating a space for everyone to feel included, valued, and represented.

Strengthening Families Through Connections

Early childhood education is a powerful tool for removing barriers for families and increasing protective factors. Childcare intersects with many co-occurring obstacles and struggles for families in poverty. Wrap-around supports include: tuition assistance, transportation, peer connections, and systems navigation.

Growing Food Justice

YWCA's children centers serve healthy, diverse meals and snacks to all children in our care. Through our Farm to Early Care & Education program, we source local food from farm partners and pursue food justice by creating equitable access to fresh produce, food learning through mealtime conversation, and family education on how to use fresh produce in meals at home. Promoting Maternal & Child Health

Addressing maternal and child racial disparities with evidence-based programs

Every baby deserves to thrive.

The impact of systemic racism is increased infant mortality for black babies. In Kalamazoo County, from 2016-2018, Black infants died at 2.8 times the rate of their white neighbors. Infant mortality affects all of us because we are all a part of this community.

YWCA's goal is for every birthing parent to have a healthy pregnancy and for every child to reach their first birthday with key developmental milestones met. Our Maternal and Child Health programs promote healthy pregnancies, positive birth outcomes, and overall well-being of infants and mothers in Kalamazoo.

Collaborating to Reduce Infant Mortality Disparities

In 2014, YWCA Kalamazoo created the Kalamazoo Infant Mortality Community Action Initiative. It grew from an abstract idea into a large collaborative effort: Cradle Kalamazoo. In 2021, YWCA again became Cradle's leader in partnership with community partners, several healthcare institutions, key funding agencies, local academic institutions, multi-denominational faith-based organizations, and both for-profit and not-for-profit organizations. Together, we work to reduce racial disparities in infant mortality through programs focused on home visitation, health equity, and education.

Supporting Families with Home Visitation


YWCA equips Kalamazoo County families with the skills and resources necessary for healthy pregnancies and raising healthy babies. Our Women and Infant Supportive Health (WISH) home visitation program provides a high-quality, culturally relevant, and evidence-informed pre-natal and post-natal curriculum-helping individuals be the best parents they can be. Wrap-around services include goal setting and skill building, advocacy and transportation to doctor visits, one-on-one and group education, assistance meeting housing or other needs, and social support. Any pregnant or current parent with children ages 0-3 years is eligible to participate.

Innovating in Family Education

In 2021, in the midst of the pandemic, YWCA Kalamazoo created the Baby Bump Program-an entirely remote, eight-week curriculum for pregnant, postpartum, and inter-conception families with children ages 0-5 years in Kalamazoo County.

Baby Bump is a guided peer support group organized around fun, hands-on activities and education related to parent health during and after pregnancy, breastfeeding, and baby safety, care, nutrition, sleep, growth, and development. Guest speakers facilitate conversations about how parents can teach, bond, and interact with their children.

Caring for Survivors of Abuse

Providing services for domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking victims and survivors

YWCA Kalamazoo provides comprehensive, free services to survivors of domestic violence, human trafficking, and sexual assault. Our services extend from emergency response during a crisis through long-term housing. We provide therapy and advocacy, access to a full legal team, support groups, and the assurance of safety.

24 Hour Crisis Line

YWCA Kalamazoo ensures that all victims can ask for help immediately and confidentially-24 hours a day, 365 days a year. YWCA 24-hour Crisis Line is the first step on the path to escape from violence.

Emergency Shelter and Housing

YWCA Kalamazoo provides free, safe shelter for victims of domestic violence and their dependent children. Food, personal needs items, clothing, and emergency transportation are included.

We also address Kalamazoo's shortage of housing for victims with our Transitional Supportive Housing Program. Providing safe residences throughout Kalamazoo, we help survivors move forward with their lives, establishing plans to build credit, start savings plans, and define achievable goals.

Supporting Sexual Assault Survivors

YWCA Kalamazoo, in partnership with Bronson, is the only provider of Sexual Assault Nurse Examinations (SANE) in the county. We offer highly-trained, specialized, culturallycompetent services to rape victims and survivors through a medical forensic examination done in a non-hospital environment, on-site at YWCA Kalamazoo.

YWCA Kalamazoo also works in partnership with the prosecutor's office through the Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI). Kalamazoo was considered a hot spot for rape kits that were backlogged and not tested. Now that those tests are being processed, we provide support to the survivors.

Sheltering Human Trafficking Survivors

YWCA Kalamazoo opened the first shelter in Michigan for labor and sex trafficking survivors including women, men, gender non-conforming people, and non-offending family members. We provide supportive services including legal, advocacy, case management, and therapy. "Being a Senior Director in Victim Services means that I get to support an entire team of incredibly talented and passionate individuals who give their all to the clients we serve every single day. Through my work with them, I like to think I still have an impact on survivors' lives by helping to create and improve client-centered programming, policy, and system change."

I knew calling the police wouldn't bring me the comfort I needed at that moment. My friend explained the work that YWCA Kalamazoo does for survivors, and I immediately knew that's where I needed to go. I arrived at the YWCA with my friend that same day to undergo a rape test in case I wanted to file charges later. While the circumstances were and still are devastating, it was such a needed, positive experience during that time. I was greeted warmly and without judgment. The nurse examiner asked for my consent every step of the way. She explained what she needed to do and why with the utmost care. She reiterated multiple times that I was not to blame, something that seems cliché until you really need to hear and believe it. I am forever grateful for the staff who jumped into action when I arrived; it was one of the first times I've ever felt believed. The work YWCA Kalamazoo does is not only life-changing, it is life-affirming."

The first of it's kind in the nation: Kalamazoo Comprehensive Reproductive Health Fund

YWCA Kalamazoo launched the Reproductive Health Fund (RHF) in November 2021–the first reproductive rights health fund of its kind in the United States. The fund eliminates financial and transportation barriers to increase access to abortion services, doula care, and gender-affirming care, as well as on-site access to emergency contraception kits. The comprehensive reproductive health fund represents a large step towards reproductive justice in Kalamazoo County.


